These young people would only be given a couple of hours off each Sunday but one in the year to attend church. Young apprentice gardeners and farm hands could leave their tasks at a low ebb of the

spring. Young kitchen maids and housemaids could take time off as no house parties would happen during Lent and many other apprentices would be given leave too.

Most of these youngsters would be up before dawn to walk home to a mother longing to hug and spoil them after a year's separation. What could she prepare as a treat for her dear daughter or son? A rich fruit cake, perhaps for family tea. This is the beginning of the traditional Simmel cake which is now part of the present day Mothering Sunday treat.

What could these young people take as a token of love for their mothers? As they walked the country lanes spring flowers would be growing in the hedgerows especially primroses. A posy of these would be the answer.

Earlier in February we had our annual bell ringers AGM. Paul, our Tower Captain decided to stand down as he is unable to commit so much time any more, although he is still joining us whenever he can, particularly on Sunday mornings. I would like to say a huge thank you to him as without his dedication, there would not still be a band ringing at Cowley. Paul will also continue to be our Steeple Keeper, which is a huge relief, as none of the rest of us fancied climbing the ladder to the trapdoor in the ringing chamber roof. Thank you Paul and we all look forward to continuing to ring with you whenever you can make it.

I have now taken over as Tower Captain, and handed the Tower Correspondent reins to Mary Bayliss, who I am sure you all know. We are all grateful to her for taking this on when so new to our band, and it has been a real blessing to have her join us as a ringer.

Becoming the new Tower Captain is a daunting task, and the moment I accepted the role I was incredibly worried I would not be up to the job. I was very touched that Geoff welcomed me to this role with a blessing a couple of Sundays ago. With a sense of support from both the band and the wider church community, I took a deep breath and told myself just to get on with it. One of the issues I want to get on with first is recruitment – yes I know I keep on nagging you all to join us, but if we don't recruit new ringers we will eventually cease to have a band. At present we are only managing fortnightly practices, and often miss Sunday service ringing. Before we recruit though, I need to make sure I am confident and experienced enough to teach. To this end I will be attending the Teaching Bell Handling module with the Association of Ringing Teachers in April. I have also been invited to be a helper on the Bristol and Gloucester Diocesan Guild training day in March. After this, I will have an experienced mentor work with me while I teach a new ringer from scratch. I hope this will hone my skills and give me the confidence to move forward in teaching, thus ensuring we have a band ringing at Cowley for many years to come.

Cowley played host to a branch ringing practice to coincide with the snowdrop weekend earlier this month, which saw a good turnout of both Cowley ringers, and ringers from other towers around the City, including Marston, Iffley, Headington and St Aldates. Everyone was very grateful for the tea and cake which was being provided by the Snowdrop weekend helpers, as it was a particularly cold day. Our practice night continues to be Thursdays from 7.30 – 9pm and we welcome visitors, whether interested in learning to ring or just curious to see what we do. FROM THE ARCHIVES

COWLEY

CHURCH & HOME MAGAZINE

March 1893

On Thursday Week, the parish tea took place in the Temple Cowley Schools, when 180 sat down to tea. The following ladies provided trays:-

Mrs Moore, Mrs Lindsay, Mrs Hitchings, Mrs Witherington, Mrs Jackson, Mrs Mare, Mrs Parker, Mrs Allen, Miss Hurst, Mrs Polley, Mrs Harris and Mrs Baker. After the teas, the choir sang some glees and songs. The students of Wycliffe Hall occupied a pleasant hour. Mr. Rowlands read an instructive piece, and Mr. Arnold sang a good song. But the greatest amusement of the evening was a farce, given by Mr. Rudman and the students from St. Kenelm's, which amused the audience very much. Both Mr. and Mrs. Rudman contributed greatly to the delight of the audience.

The Vicar, after thanking the ladies for providing such an excellent tea, and those who had contributed so largely to the enjoyment of the evening, went on to say that the money which had been paid for admission was to be devoted to the fund for supplying their excellent parish school with books and apparatus. Those in the parish with means had shown a most excellent spirit in giving so willingly such a good tea, and others who were not present had promised money. The parish churchwarden and Mrs. Pether, of Bartlemas, had sent gifts, and another lady who was not present had sent a sovereign. This was a clear indication to his mind how generous their friends had been; they had fed 180 excellently, and there was enough food left (for the children who attend the schools) for 180 more. He felt that the task would not have been difficult to supply as many

more, if the rooms could have received them. It was seven years since they had their last parish tea, and he saw signs of great improvements taking place. Even sin and misrepresentation struggled hardest at the end, but these in the run of life would be certain to lose the race. Only work that reason told us was permanent was worthy of the name of Christian. With the improvements there was still an element of mischief, but it must be evident to every person who had sufficient intelligence to pass the fourth standard of their elementary schools that this in their parish was dying out. He begged them to stand by the Church in her struggle to provide elementary education for the children of the poorer classes in this country. The Church did not wish to interfere with those who dissented from her, but she did wish to provide for those children whose parents desired a religious knowledge as well as a secular one for their children. The rooms in which they were assembled, and which had but recently been erected, were proof of the vitality of those who were attached to the English Church, and he could only assure them that nothing but real necessity on the ground of poverty would close their schools. The steady work of the Church would in the long run succeed over the noisy political agitators, who were careful not to spend their own money, and showed by their past history that they were not really interested in the welfare of their children.

The Culprit is found!

I have some clumps of snowdrops just outside my living room window - great to see in the depths of winter. However, last year, and also this, the flowers seemed to disappear as soon as they showed. I now know what has been happening since I saw a wren in the act of nibbling! It is rare to spot these delightful little birds and, I suppose, even rarer to catch one in the act of denying me my snowdrop flowers.

Actually, these clumps are rather overcrowded and I will be splitting them up and spreading them around the garden as soon as I can while they are still "in the green".

I have ordered my fruit trees for my south-facing back border with the new fence behind. They should arrive pretty soon and they will be bare-rooted. As I will be planting where a large laurel hedge has been for over 40 years, I will be giving the roots of the new trees a sprinkling of mycorrhiza to help them get established. These fungi form a symbiotic relationship with plant roots, increasing their surface area so nutrients can be taken up in greater quantities and also provide some disease resistance. I will not be enriching the planting holes with rich compost though, as this would not encourage roots to spread further. I don't want them rocking in the wind with roots growing round and round in a small space.

Around these trees, this season, I am going for annuals that I will direct sow ensuring I get colour, scent and, especially, nectar for the bees. I would like to go for wild, i.e. native, flowers but I am afraid I would have to have some exotics, like sunflowers, too. I hope to encourage any local hedgehogs to deal with my slug problem. As it is I will have to go for some beer traps anyway, containers of beer sunk into the ground and covered with a tile or slate to encourage the critters to hide under and then find the delights of whatever brew is cheapest and drown within. I will give them a try as I don't want to go down the chemical, slug pellet, route.

I have started seed sowing in my little electric propagator. This next couple of months will be filled with more seed-sowing, pricking out and potting on. All this in preparation for the Plant Sale on Saturday May 14th. I do hope that some of you will be doing the same so we have a great display for sale on the day.

The wet weather has been against much work on the allotment, but as soon as my Other Half gets going, I shall be down there. The first job I need him to do is to dig a bean trench so annual weeds and crop remains can be placed in there to provide the moisture for our runner beans to do their best.

I am currently trying to tidy up the garden, shed and greenhouse in preparation for the new season but, today, I have been forced indoors by a cruel and lazy (one that goes through you instead of round) wind. Can't wait to really get going!
