## PASTORAL NETWORK

Hands up everyone who attends St James Church! You are part of the St James Pastoral Network – oh yes you are! A list of names will be available soon when you will be able to check that:

- (a) your name is on the list, and
- (b) who your Link Person and Buddy is.

At St James there are 13 Linkers and at the moment 7 Buddies. These lovely people are not saying that they have 'perfect' lives with 'perfect' families, with no difficulties or problems in their own lives but they are saying that being part of the Community of St James Church is being there for each other. As our Core Values put it: 'we are called to serve one another, to be an encouragement to those who are having a hard time, to sing and laugh and cry together in the journey of life.'

These Linkers and Buddies want to have communication with those they are linked with and may well ask you how you are! If your usual pattern of church attendance varies for some reason, they might well phone you to see if everything is OK with you. It's part of us all caring for each other. It's a showing-love role. The Buddy role is not onerous, simply a named person who does what most of us in the congregation do, care for one another. They also seek to offer support to the Linker, looking out for the folk on the Linker's list if the Link Person is absent from church for instance; maybe committing to saying a quick prayer once in a while for those people; perhaps coming to our quarterly Network meetings with or instead of the Linker. We are looking for more Buddies – could you be one?

At present St Francis have a similar system and will be joining Pastoral Network meetings to ensure both churches work along the same lines.

Of course the Pastoral Network is not a substitute for being friends and having friends! We at church are Church Family and friendships are valued. I recently heard a Christian Speaker say 'being a Christian is simple but not easy', let's be active in looking after each other.

We continually review the way the system works, and our next Pastoral Network meeting is on 19<sup>th</sup> July at 3.30 pm, when we will be meeting over tea in the Rectory Garden.

## SAFEGUARDING

As Christians, we are all of course committed to protecting and safeguarding children, young people and vulnerable adults; we are on track to ensuring that all our Parish officers and volunteers who have any contact with or the chance to influence children, young people or vulnerable adults or who have access to confidential information or who visit parishioners in their homes comply with the latest Anglican training requirements.

We have now run the on line **Basic awareness course (C0)** 5 times at St James Centre – that's for the majority of our volunteer officers. It covers the whole spectrum of safeguarding and is especially adapted to church life and values. It can be followed individually as can the **Foundation course (C1)**, but that will also be a delivered course on a Saturday morning, hopefully in July, for those working with children & young people or visiting homes.

For certain Parish roles there will also be **C2, S1 and S2** courses.

**If you are a:** verger, sidesperson/welcomer, flower arranger, bell ringer, office volunteer, reader, chalice administrator, coffee server, church committee member, PCC member, Children's Church/Sunday Club leader, Little Stars/Seashells worker, Open the Book team member, church warden, choir leader, pastoral team member, prayer space leader, volunteer driver **you should have received a letter or e-mail from Lesley. If you have slipped through the net, *please contact Lesley immediately.***

Just a few people are still to sign up for C0 – we may have to run one more session for them.

Anyone else who recognises that **Safeguarding is everyone's responsibility** is welcome to study the course – speak to Lesley Williams, Parish Safeguarding Officer

## UNA'S CORNER

### St Lukes Church

I was interested in David Cook's description of the laying of the stone at St Luke's. I was born in 1937 and I do remember that my father and lots of people of his generation called the church the Works Church because Billy Morris alias Lord Nuffield gave the money for it. It was a very big church. My first memories of Cowley churches were when Father Whye was vicar.

When the Rev Patrick Parry-Okeden was our vicar he was leaving St Luke's one day when something fell before his eyes and landed with a crash at his feet. It was one of the hands from the clock on the tower. It was very large at close quarters, metal and very heavy. If Patrick had been a fraction of a second earlier it would have fallen on his head and in all probability killed him.

In St Luke's the organ was in the chancel, on the right with the organist with his back to the choir stalls. The organ went to a church in Australia after the church closed.

It was a very good church for large parades and we used it for Guide parades. I was Division Commissioner for City 1 for the Guides, that is for the area of the city East of Magdalen Bridge. I remember one Division Church Parade years ago when I insulted the Mayor of Oxford – it could have been the Lord Mayor I am not sure if the promotion had been made. I organised the seating so that the Brownies occupied the front seats as I felt that was the best place for them to see what was going on. I put the Mayor and his entourage immediately behind the Brownies, he was in his regalia and chain. Behind him were the Guides with adults at the back.

The mayor's sergeant came to me and said that I had insulted the Mayor, he should have been put at the front. I was horrified. I went over to the mayor and apologised to him and said I did not intend any insult, I just wanted the Brownies to be able to see what was going on at the front of the church. He was very gracious and said he was happy where he was. I offered to move some Brownies and put him in front but he would not hear of that.

My parents were invited to the Lord Mayor's for a drink when my son was a small boy in a pushchair, and I went with him. This was Evan Roberts the first Lord Mayor of Oxford. Lionel Harrison was the last Mayor of Oxford.

## Sunnyside Estate – Further information

At the bottom of the gardens of houses situated in Bleache Place, Wilkins Road and Marshall Road there was a stretch of land (the entrance to which was in Marshall Road). On this land was Mr Payne's bakery. The family lived in one of the houses in Bleache Place. I recall being sent to buy bread, taking the necessary 4½d, and picking at the warm bread and eating it whilst taking the bread home. They delivered bread on a horse and cart. The horse's name was Maggie! At Christmas time Mr Payne would cook people's Christmas dinners for them.

# FROM THE ARCHIVES

## Cowley Church & Parish Magazine

JUNE 1966

### COWLEY FATHERS

*On May 6 the Society of St John the Evangelist celebrated its centenary. The Cowley Fathers are especially close to the parish of Cowley as their founder, Fr Benson, was Vicar of this parish before he moved nearer into Oxford and with two others started the Society. Many people who now live in this parish once worshipped in the Cowley Fathers' church in Iffley Road, and many have a great affection for the Fathers. Mr John Sawyer, now a worshipper at St Luke's, recalls his boyhood with the Cowley Fathers:*

When the Church festivals of Christmas, Easter and Whitsun occur each year, I am reminded of my early days with the Cowley Fathers. Maybe you do not know what a boat boy is, so I will explain:

He is the small boy who carries a metal vessel filled with incense and shaped like a boat, hence the name. During procession he walks on the left of the server who swings the censer, and when necessary puts more incense on the charcoal with a small spoon. I well remember walking in procession round the Cowley Fathers' church with Brother Gregory. He was very tall, large and jovial. When we turned a corner, he swung the censer right over three times, and then he opened it and held it under my nose so that I might put more incense in. The incense made my eyes water and I always felt that Brother Gregory was chuckling to himself.

It was Brother Robert who taught me the duties of a server and I spent many quiet hours with him learning how to carry a candle, when to move, kneel or sit during services. Brother Robert was an albino, that is, although young, he had white hair and pink eyes. I noticed his eyes especially because I painted his portrait. They were a very beautiful colour. As he was not allowed to possess anything, he gave the portrait to his mother. He used to come to our home, always at tea time and was the only person allowed to sit in my father's chair. This was a large Windsor chair with arms and when my father came in, Brother Robert would get up, but my father always told him to stay where he was. We all liked him very much.

When I served at the 8 o'clock service, I was allowed to be late for school. After the service, the Father and I had our breakfast together in the Mission House. The cook in those days was Fr. Strong. He stood at the door of the kitchen as I came away from the table and beckoning to me would fill my pockets with oranges and apples 'for play-time'.

Palm Sunday was a great day for us <sup>7</sup> servers. During the procession we car-

signed by Fr. Bull 1903. He became Superior when Fr. Benson was ageing.

I well remember Fr. Benson preaching his last sermon during Evensong. I believe he was then about 90 years old and had to be helped up the steps of the pulpit.

Fr. O'Brien who died a few years ago was my last link with the Cowley Fathers. In my young days he was a Sunday school teacher. I also knew Fr. Turner who was drowned while trying to rescue a boy in the sea.

The Fathers used to give us servers and choirboys great treats. I remember going with them to Bournemouth when it was white cliffs before the promenade was built and another time we went to London, visiting the Tower and St. Paul's. We were given a special treat at Christmas in the Mission House with tables loaded with all sorts of good things.

I hope I have not given the impression that I remember the Cowley




## Cowley Team Ministry at the National Pilgrimage Walsingham May 28<sup>th</sup>
