

# 90 MILLION DISCIPLES

In his rector's letter last month Geoff encouraged us to reflect on whether we are Searchers, Disciples, Servants or Apostles – four descriptions that are used in the Bible for those of us who choose to follow Jesus and do things God's way. I hope you were able to see some signs of discipleship in your life, not forgetting the searching, serving and apostleship. A disciple is very simply a person who has decided to live their life alongside the Master, learning from Him, obeying Him, living the way He does. As Anglican Archbishop Michael Curry in the USA says, "living as Jesus People".

Jose lives in Santiago, Chile. Four years ago he read the Bible for the first time and was so struck by the quality of Jesus' life that he decided to live the rest of his life as much like Jesus as he could. He is a young artist working for an advertising business. When I met him last year he was using his skills to create "street art" to encourage others to ask questions about life, meaning and Jesus. (The one in this picture is by a fast flowing city river.)



If you are a disciple you are not alone. On current estimates there are 2.2 billion Christians in the world and 90 million of them are Anglicans – most of them in Africa. What you may not yet know is that the nine years between 2016 and 2025 have been designated as a global "Season of Intentional Discipleship" for Anglicans – a time to focus on how we live more closely to Jesus, living His way. Discipleship will be a key word for Anglicans for the next nine years.

I feel very privileged to be on the small group that will coordinate this "Season". We will be meeting later this month and I would like to ask you to pray for us. We are a very mixed group – just two from the UK (Bishop Stephen Cottrell and myself), a priest from Congo, an Archbishop from Malaysia, a youth worker from Zambia, a lay woman from the Pacific Islands, a female priest from New York and a few more – just 11 of us. Please pray for wisdom and a sensitivity to God's Spirit. We meet from 24-27 April. More importantly, pray that God will help every one of the 90 million Anglicans to be His disciple.

Last week I met a man in one of our churches who said he was nervous about what his colleagues at work would think if they knew he was following Jesus, trying to live like Him. In Pakistan I know a family who had to flee from their house because neighbours objected to them following Jesus and threatened violence. Being a disciple, following Jesus, has never been easy. Does that mean you will not choose this way? Or is Jesus so important to you that you will follow him whatever happens?

# FROM THE ARCHIVES

COWLEY CHURCH & HOME MAGAZINE

April 1894

On Thursday, 22nd March, a tea was held in the Temple Cowley Schools, to bid goodbye to Mr. Bennett. Fifty of those who have attended the week-day services conducted by Captain Bennett, were present. The following is a short account of what took place:

"Captain" Bennett, who has been working under the Vicar of Cowley, is to leave in the course of a few days, and this week is the recipient of a gratifying testimonial. In making the presentation the Vicar said he thought it right to bear his testimony to the principal features of "Captain" Bennett's work. He was sure "Captain" Bennett would feel when he had gone, that he had done no mischief. There were not many teachers of religion who could honestly say that. "Captain" Bennett had been perfectly straightforward and truthful in his work with him, and he had been drawn again and again in sympathy towards him when evidence had reached him from residents in the parish that these qualities existed in his life. He need hardly say that those were rare gifts and very seldom to be found amongst the class to which Mr. Bennett belonged.

Those of them who heard Mr. Clifford, the hon. Secretary of the Church Army, when he gave a lecture in that room, on "Father Damien", would remember his description of Mr. Bennett and his work. He was, he said, a working man who had come to Cowley parish on a mission to the working men. Mr. Clifford struck him as the right man in the right place. He was a gentleman of culture, with the love of God and man in his heart. He understood the office and work of a clergyman, he is not led away from the real issue at stake in work of this kind, and he could say he was a most excellent guide for men like Mr. Bennett. Those of them before him had recognised Mr. Bennett's earnestness by the attendance of his weekly meetings, which had grown from three to 35 or 40.

They had had no secular inducements offered to them, and he thought it right to tell them that he had not given one penny to Mr. Bennett. He had paid his salary, and he thought it right to stop there. There had been no distribution of money through his hands in any shape or form. "Captain" Bennett had ever been ready to do what he told him; this again was an excellent spirit wherever it was found, for, as they knew, he was the responsible person for the English Church in that parish, and those that did not work in harmony with him had no right there.

"Captain" Bennett had taken an interest, in addition to the services which he held in the Schoolrooms, in the Reading Room, the Band of Hope, the Sunday Schools, and he had visited every house, he believed. Only a few days ago he read his notes, and he would tell them that he knew the tendency of his remarks with regard to every family in his parish. Every one of them knew that no man in England knew his parish better than he (the Vicar) did. He felt that they wished Mr. Bennett every good wish wherever he was sent to work, and that he was glad to meet them on this occasion to wish him God speed. Mr. Webb, one of the masters of St. Kenelm's, who was also a B.A. of Exeter

College, was to be ordained as curate at the parish at Trinity, and he would take charge of the services held in that room. He hoped they would make him their friend; they might rely on it that he would have their best interests at heart. The Vicar then gave to Mr. Bennett a beautiful Bible and a writing case, which had been subscribed for by the fifty friends present. "Captain" Bennett suitably acknowledged the compliment.

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On Tuesday, the 27th March, the Reverend Henry Mare very kindly gave his annual break-up-day in the Temple Cowley School, and allowed those who desired, to attend for a small payment, which went to the new building now being erected. £2. 6s. was taken, and we thank all those who took part in the entertainment for the great trouble they had taken. Everyone present was delighted at the whole proceedings, and we hope that the rev. gentleman will see his way to repeat this at another time.

# Deanery Synod Meeting

A meeting of the Deanery Synod was held at St James Church Centre on the 7 March 2017. The following items were discussed:

- ∅ There was a presentation from Jayne Ozanne who is the General Synod Rep who spoke on the recent vote on the issue of sexuality. Jayne pointed out that this was a joint discussion between Laity and Clergy in parallel more than about same sex marriage. Jayne's personal mission was to help bring the discussion of sexuality to the middle ground rather than the political extremes in the debate and spoke of progress in increasing the middle ground views on the subject. Jayne emphasised the importance of improving attitudes on the subject as many LGBT children of faith families do end up homeless to avoid forms of abuse. Lack of acceptance of LGBT children also leads at times to self-harm and suicide. Fortunately for us, it seems that the Diocese of Oxford is one of the most diverse and involved in the debate.
- ∅ Trevor Jones gave us a financial report showing that the General Account was in the black with only a small amount outstanding which was covered by donations. There was a slight forecast deficit for the year with a shortfall of £2,500. Churches should be encouraged to pay more if they can.
- ∅ Geoff, our Rector, promoted the new Joint Deanery website (that I would encourage all of us who have internet access to look at and to promote when the moment arises) [www.oxfordanglican.co.uk](http://www.oxfordanglican.co.uk). As well as much useful information of what is happening in Oxford and Cowley churches, it also has a sign-up form. Well worth a look at!
- ∅ Tim Stead gave us a presentation and said that Headington Quarry was looking for a children's worker.
- ∅ There was a presentation about making Oxford welcoming to asylum speakers and we were shown that a major initiative has been growing over the past few years called "Sanctuary Hosting" that provides, after a period of vetting, accommodation in people's homes for people fleeing from persecution abroad.

The initiative was set up in 2015. The demonstration in 2016 called "Refugees are welcome" promoted the hosting scheme. There were many volunteers and it was called a revolution of generosity. 55 new hosts and 34 people have been helped off the streets. Some of the stories that were told to us were heart wrenching and it was really great that this initiative was in operation.

Things we can do:

- ∅ Being a host
- ∅ Volunteers to meet guests and hosts
- ∅ Donations
- ∅ Provision of low rent properties

Homelessness: Bethan Willis, the Assistant Social Responsibility Officer for the Diocese of



Oxford presented on the growing homelessness problem. Within Oxford there may be a few hundred rough sleeping. The figure has doubled since 2010. 75% of those needing help were affected by addiction or mental health problems. Oxford is losing 130 hostel places. And some hostels are closing down entirely. Unlike historically, when relationship breakdown was the biggest contributing factor in homelessness, end of private tenancy has become the new main factor in making homelessness happen. Landlords do not give accommodation to those on housing benefit. The vulnerability is increased to the point whereby the national average deposit that is needed is £2000.

Things we can do:

- ∅ Report rough sleepers to OXSPOT
- ∅ Spend time with rough sleepers
- ∅ Give clothes, money, food and time to charities
- ∅ Work with others, for instance through WNS (Winter Night Shelter) and SWEP (Severe Weather Emergency Protocol)

Oxfordshire Credit Union + St Matthews (Interest free loans to help set up homes)

CRISIS (finance provision)

EMMAUS Oxford (Provides 36 hours work a week and accommodation)

## RECIPE

What's in Season in April – the following are listed on the web:

Asparagus, broccoli, jersey royal new potatoes, lettuce & salad leaves, purple sprouting broccoli, radishes, rocket, samphire, spinach, spring onions, watercress, wild nettles  
Bananas (Windward), kiwi fruit, rhubarb  
Basil, chives, dill, sorrel  
Lamb, wood pigeon  
Cockles, crab, langoustine, lobster, plaice, prawns, salmon, sea trout, shrimp, whitebait



While you are shopping for food in season, you might also like to shop for the following (an Easter treat – the pavlova at the Mothers' Union Quiz and Puddings evening were delicious so it may be that some of you have already got your favourite recipes!)

Easy Pavlova (serves 8)

### Ingredients

4 egg whites  
250g caster sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
1 teaspoon lemon juice  
2 teaspoons cornflour  
475ml whipping cream, whipped  
6 kiwi fruits, peeled and sliced

### Method

Pre-heat oven to 150 C / Gas mark 2  
Line a baking tray with baking parchment. Draw a 23cm (9 in) circle on the parchment.  
In a large bowl, beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Gradually add in the sugar, 1 tablespoon at a time, beating well after each addition. Beat until thick and glossy. Overbeaten egg whites lose volume and deflate when folded into other ingredients. Be absolutely sure not a particle of grease or egg yolk gets into the whites. Gently fold in vanilla extract, lemon juice and cornflour.

Spoon mixture inside the circle drawn on the parchment. Working from the centre, spread mixture towards the outside edge, building edge slightly. This should leave a slight depression in the centre.

Bake for 1 hour. Cool on a wire rack.

Remove the parchment, and place meringue on a flat serving plate. Fill the centre of the meringue with whipped cream, sweetened if desired. Top whipped cream with kiwi fruit slices.

**Tip:** To keep your meringue from being flat and grainy, try beating egg whites until stiff but not dry. Overbeaten egg whites lose volume and deflate when folded into other ingredients. Also, when beating in sugar, beat in about 1 tablespoon at a time, beating well between each addition. Then beat until meringue is thick, white and glossy. Be absolutely sure not a particle of grease or egg yolk gets into the whites.

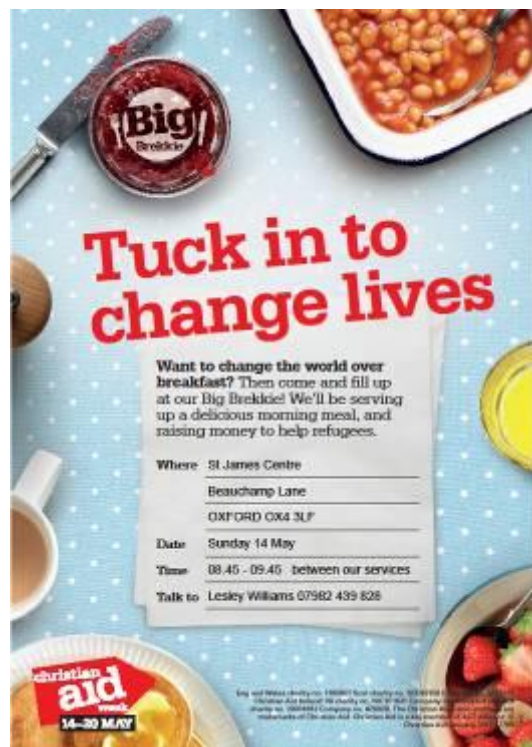

Article from Oxford Diocesan Council - Christian Aid Week 2017

Sixty years ago, a generation of Christians decided they would not stand by whilst people suffered in refugee camps amidst the aftermath of the Second World War. Inspired by the teaching of Jesus Christ, they could not sit back while their neighbours suffered. They shared Jesus' outrage over injustice and were prepared to do something about it.

That dedication and generosity led to the creation of Christian Aid Week, which today unites 20,000 churches across the country that come together to achieve incredible things to continue to support our global neighbours in need, who are suffering through no fault of their own.





Today, tens of millions of people – fathers, mothers and children - across the globe are still fleeing their homes, and making dangerous journeys in search of safety. Christian Aid is not turning its back now, and continues to support refugees around the world, who are fleeing their homes due to conflict, war and disaster.



While the majority of today's refugees seek sanctuary in poor countries, in 2015 some one million people crossed into Europe. With borders in Europe now closed, thousands of desperate refugees are finding themselves stranded in countries including Greece and Serbia – and in need of urgent help.



Nejebbar, from Afghanistan, fled her homeland after the Taliban announced they would kill anyone who worked for the government, like her husband Noor. They eventually sought refuge in Greece with their children, after a treacherous journey across the Mediterranean in a small rubber dinghy. The young family have left their home, family and friends behind, and now live with no certainty of their future, especially that of their children.

With the help of you, our supporters, Christian Aid and its global partners continue to provide support for refugees, like Nejebbar and Noor, with essentials including, food, shelter and job skills training, as well as advocating for policies to protect them and help them on the ground.

# H2O (Here to Help Oxford) Befriend Project

A letter has been received from the new H2O (Here to Help Oxford) befriending project, which has emerged from Viva's Doorsteps initiative. Their 2015 research looked at how churches are responding to the needs of children and young people in Oxfordshire, with respect to poverty, vulnerability and the gaps between needs and interventions. They found that 'struggling families' was one of the most significant issues raised by families themselves as well as churches and professionals.

In response to this, they are in the process of establishing a befriending project in East Oxford. Their aim is to recruit volunteers, or family friends, to walk alongside families with primary school aged children who are struggling. Parenting is full of challenges, and we want to be able to hold out a hand to parents who are feeling isolated, stressed or finding it difficult to cope.

The following volunteer advertisement sets out what they require:

Are you a good listener?  
Could you come alongside a local family?



We are looking for volunteer befrienders to join our pilot scheme walking alongside and supporting families with children aged 5-11 in East Oxford who are facing challenges. Could you give up to two hours a week, for a minimum of six months, to help a family realise their own strengths? It is likely to change you too!

Viva is an international children's charity passionate about releasing children from poverty and abuse. Doorsteps is an initiative of Viva which helps local Christians to work together to better support Oxfordshire's children, young people and their families

They believe working together is vital both to serve as a witness to the local community and in order to make the project sustainable in the long term.
