



10 am Sunday June 16<sup>th</sup> St James Church we are looking forward to a confirmation service led by Bishop Steve Croft. Followed by a bring-and-share lunch. It is a chance to get together and celebrate the growing faith of friends and family. This year all our candidates are adults. Some have journeyed down long roads with us. Others have only recently joined our pilgrims journey. For all of them Confirmation is an important step, a chance to make for oneself the promises made by adults and Godparents many years ago. A chance to say for themselves "I want what Jesus can give me". There will be no 10:30 service at St Francis on that day but there will be the usual 8 am service at St James.



2 pm Sunday June 23<sup>rd</sup>, St Andrews Church Linton Road, Oxford, OX2 6UG. We gather with Revd Gemma Beesley for her Service of Ordination to the Priesthood. It is an occasion when the church recognises and commissions her into the role of a church leader. These words are used to describe the process.

*"God calls his people to follow Christ, and forms us into a royal priesthood, a holy nation, to declare the wonderful deeds of him who has called us out of darkness into his marvellous light."*

*The Church is the Body of Christ, the people of God and the dwelling-place of the Holy Spirit. In baptism the whole Church is summoned to witness to God's love and to work for the*

*coming of his kingdom.*

*To serve this royal priesthood, God has given particular ministries. Priests are ordained to lead God's people in the offering of praise and the proclamation of the gospel. They share with the Bishop in the oversight of the Church, delighting in its beauty and rejoicing in its well-being. They are to set the example of the Good Shepherd always before them as the pattern of their calling. With the Bishop and their fellow presbyters, they are to sustain the community of the faithful by the ministry of word and sacrament, that we all may grow into the fullness of Christ and be a living sacrifice acceptable to God."*

It makes it clear that ordination to the Priesthood comes within the calling of the whole people of God to be Royal Priests.

It will be great for as many people as possible to join us. If you would like to come but need transport, please let Geoff know, or sign up at the back of church.

Our normal services will take place on that day.

10:30 am Sunday 30<sup>th</sup> June St Francis Church. We gather with Revd Gemma as she leads her first communion service. We will follow the service with a bring-and-share lunch. There will be no 10 am service at St James on this day.

11 am 21<sup>st</sup> July Love Oxford a chance for Christians

across Oxford to meet together in the centre of town. Our service pattern will change on that day so we can go along and join our brothers and sisters!

# CHILDREN'S CORNER

Do you like surprises? I must say that I do like the good ones but sometimes the wrong ones occur for me these days. I'll just tell you about a couple of them.

After I left school and started work, right at the bottom of the tree, as they say, I had all sorts of jobs around an office, so it was quite a surprise after two years to join the Royal Air Force for National Service. I was committed to two years in the services as all young men had to do this at that time. Yes it was different being in uniform and being drilled and learning how to march, but also learn special skills that allowed me to work in the air traffic control tower. The training was completed at a special school but the surprise was that although most of the group were sent overseas, my posting was to RAF Benson. So close, that I could cycle home when I had some spare time!

On Wednesday afternoon, all staff not required for duty were encouraged to do some sport, or you were free to do other things, preferably on the station in case of emergency. I found out that occasionally aircraft had to ferry parts to other airfields or the pilot need to get some extra flying time and you could apply to fly as a passenger. I called in at the required hanger, that is the name of the aircraft garage, and found that one pilot had to do at least one hour flying that afternoon and I could go with him if I wanted to. When he found out that it would be my first flight in an aircraft, AND that I lived in Oxford, only 10 miles away, he asked me to show him where we lived and told me to hop in.

My next surprise was to find that half the floor was missing! He told me to be careful. The aircraft was usually used for taking photographs for mapping purposes, and the cameras had been removed. So I settled down to

a rather noisy but enjoyable flight. As we flew over Cowley, I could see that we had visitors with a motorcycle and sidecar. I guessed who this might be, because only one uncle of mine had a motorcycle. In the evening I phoned home and told my parents that I knew that visitors had called, which surprised them, and especially that I was in the plane that kept circling around. They thought it was looking for somewhere to land, but it was only me having a good look from the air.

Of course, you should try to avoid bad surprises, like going shopping for something special and forgetting the money to pay for it, especially if it is the last one! A good phrase to remember is the Scout motto - 'Be prepared'. Surprises will happen. Don't worry. Sit down and think what has to be done and find out if you can get the same result by doing it a different way. By re-thinking about the job to be done, you might find an even better way to reach your goal.

And did you get a surprise at the answer to last month's query. That's right. Our St. George doesn't have a shield. Although he is often shown as a knight in armour on a horse with shield and staff, he was more likely to be a foot soldier with a sword. Whatever his history, he is the patron saint of England. The Red Cross on a white background was adopted as his flag and is repeated on his shield if he has one.

And now instead of me giving you a question to answer, how about you giving me a surprise and telling me if you had a surprise recently.....

Four members attended the Spring Meeting and found it a most interesting and rewarding day. The workshops gave us a perspective on the activities and projects which are undertaken by branches across the diocese. We came away with a list of ideas to feed into future programmes.

The other item of note on the agenda was planning for our forthcoming visit to Cuddesdon on the 17 June. It will take the shape of a picnic tea after time spent in the new chapel. As we shall each need to take a folding garden chair, Geoff has agreed to borrow the Asian Church mini-bus (and drive it!) as we did for our June meeting last year. Each member is also asked to bring a contribution to the picnic. Some members are happy to offer lifts in their own cars but the "luggage" can be transported in the mini-bus. We shall leave the Church Centre at our usual time of 2.15 pm.

Our speaker last month was the delightful Jane Gallagher who told us about the excellent work being done at the Florence Park Community Centre's mother and baby group. It meets once a week offering friendship, sup-

port and advice (together with home-made cake and "posh" coffee) to mums and the occasional dad with very small babies. Their policy is to move their mums and babies on, when the child reaches about nine months, to groups such as our Seashells where there are more suitable toys and stimulation for that age group. She explained about how she and other friends she knew had experienced isolation in the immediate weeks and months after the birth of a new baby and how extraordinarily successful has been their group in helping to solve this at Florence Park. We as a branch have been invited to visit their group on 18<sup>th</sup> July and several members have expressed a wish to do so. More details in next months' report.

On Tuesday, 4<sup>th</sup> of this month when we shall celebrate corporate communion as usual in the Ranklin Room at the Church Centre, our Mothers' Union Enterprises trustee is bringing a wide selection of lovely cards, booklets and other "goodies". She is setting up her stall at the Lunch Club so we hope lots of people will spend money on her stall to make her visit worthwhile.

Those on duty had fun playing bagatelle and the flowerpot marble challenge. We could not persuade many passers-by to have a go so bagatelle was won by Sonica Tassell, with a beginner's luck, and the marble challenge by Lesley Williams!

This is a bit of an approximation as some donations were made on the card reader 'Goodbox' and we will not know exactly how much until later.

That is considerably down on previous years but it is still good to note that with every £300 we collected, Christian Aid can provide a new delivery bed in the planned new health centre in the community of Sawula in Sierra Leone, so more mums like Jebbeh, who featured on the CAW posters and envelopes, can deliver their babies safely.

The current health centre is the size of a small bedroom. Operations, deliveries and baby check-ups all happen in one single room with only two delivery beds. Nurse Judith works around the clock to meet the needs of mums and young children who come to the clinic. But the need is great, and sometimes she is forced to send people away.

When women come to the clinic at night, there is no light for Judith to use. So she has to ask her patients to bring a torch to see by.

In addition to this, there are often not enough drugs at the clinic. Judith sees diseases like malaria and typhoid, especially in children. She has to go on a motorbike or sometimes walk for three hours to collect drugs.

*'I need help' nurse Judith says. 'Women are dying from childbirth, children under five are dying, because of poverty. Please help us.'*

*"We'll dance for three days when we have the new health centre"*

THANK YOU to all who gave their time and energy in any way and those who donated. Christian Aid is one of the Parish of Cowley's annual mission giving commitments. The members of staff in the Oxford office think we're wonderful!

## RECIPES

### Red Onion Tart (serves 4)

#### Ingredients:

one 35 x 22.5cm sheet ready-rolled puff pastry  
300g asparagus spears, halved lengthways  
olive oil coarse sea salt  
juice and grated zest of 1 lemon  
4 red onions, finely sliced  
1 tsp dried thyme 1 tbsp sugar  
dash of red wine vinegar  
salt and freshly ground black pepper  
450g frozen peas  
30g fresh mint leaves, roughly chopped

#### Method:

- ∅ Heat 2 tablespoons of oil in a non-stick frying pan. Add the onions and season. Sweat for several minutes, then sprinkle the dried thyme and sugar over. Once the onions begin to soften, add the red wine vinegar. Add a dash of oil if necessary and allow to sweat gently for 30 minutes until completely soft.
- ∅ Meanwhile, place the peas in a bowl of boiling water. After a few minutes, drain and place in a food processor with the mint, 2 tablespoons of oil and lemon juice. Season and blitz to form a coarse purée.
- ∅ Preheat the oven to 200°C/gas mark 6. Cut the pastry into 4 equal rectangles and place on baking trays.
- ∅ Leaving a 1cm border around the edge of each pastry rectangle, spread a quarter of the pea purée over each, followed by a quarter of the caramelised onions. Arrange the asparagus over the top. Drizzle with a little olive oil, season and bake for 25–30 minutes.
- ∅ Finish with the lemon zest, a fine sprinkling of freshly chopped mint and a pinch of coarse sea salt.

Recipe from 'Keep it Vegan' by Áine Carlin. Published by Kyle Books, priced at £14.99.



The following recipe (from *Cakes, Bakes, Puddings and Prayers* by Susan Over) says this is an excellent quick – and – easy pudding for summer evenings. The sharpness of the yogurt contrasts with the sweetness of the topping and the 'treasure'.

### Buried Treasure (serves 6)

#### Ingredients:

2-3 large bananas  
2-3 squares of plain fudge or 50g (2oz) soft brown sugar  
284 ml carton double cream  
275 (10 oz) Greek yogurt  
50-75g (2-3 oz) icing sugar

#### Method:

- ∅ Slice bananas and place in a deep heatproof serving dish, approximately 21 cm x 16 cm (8in x 6in). Either chop fudge into small dice and sprinkle over bananas, or sprinkle with soft brown sugar.
- ∅ Whip cream and yogurt together until thick and spread over fruit, keeping surface as level as possible. Chill for at least 1 hour.
- ∅ Dust with half the icing sugar and place under preheated grill for 3-4 minutes until sugar caramelises (watch carefully) or use a kitchen blowtorch. Repeat with remaining icing sugar.
- ∅ Chill for a few minutes until topping is crisp and serve within an hour to prevent caramel from softening.

For a more sophisticated version, soak 50g (2oz) raisins in rum for 2 hours and add to bananas, reducing the amount of fudge or sugar

### THE SLADE WILL SOON BE OF AGE

The Slade Hospital has nearly "come of age" for it was opened almost 21 years ago in February 1939, as the Isolation Hospital for the Oxford area. A good many changes in hospital design have taken place there since 1939 and it is not now, perhaps, the model up-to-date hospital it once was, but it is still very good.

In the early days the Slade's 80 beds were used for tubercular and infectious cases. Today, however, the incidence of TB has fallen so considerably that patients with many other chest illnesses - asthma and bronchitis, for example - are admitted, and one third of the beds are used for patients with skin diseases, the Dermatological Unit having been transferred from Radcliffe Infirmary in 1949.

As anyone who has travelled along the new by-pass will know, the Slade Hospital stands in extensive grounds, so not only is there plenty of fresh air for the patients, but plenty of home-grown vegetables too. Meals in an isolation hospital involve special difficulties and because of the risk of spreading infection, all crockery is boiled before every meal.

Miss CA McLeod has been matron of the hospital since 1954, and in her time the pattern of patients has continually changed. A few years ago considerable numbers of mild polio cases were admitted, though the more serious ones go to the Churchill. But in 1959 not a single polio patient from the City of Oxford entered the Slade.


A number of trained nurses under Miss McLeod are married and live in their own homes: the others have very pleasant rooms in the hospital. Girls training to become 'State Assistant' nurses spend part of their two-year course on the chest and infectious wards --- the skin wards are staffed by student nurses from the Radcliffe. Among the nurses there are often several from other countries and at present there are a number from Spain.

The Slade is a friendly hospital and there are usually several children as patients --- the youngest recently was three days old --- who can be visited by their mothers as often as they like.

Other frequent visitors are the clergy --- Fr. Topley (St. Francis), Fr. McKenna (Roman Catholic), and the Rev. B. Rowlands (Congregational), who regularly bring Communion into the wards.

NEW DEAL FOR THE HOMELESS



Homeless Units are big news at the moment and in Cowley, Slade Camp is about to undergo a radical change. From May of this year, the responsibility of the Unit will fall upon the Children's Department, and not upon the Health Department as in the past. The Unit has only been in Slade Park since the spring of 1962. Before that it was at 'The Laurels' on London Road, Headington.

At first, it consisted of 2 two-bedroomed huts, and 1 four-bedroomed hut, which were divided up to give accommodation for the Warden and a series of single rooms for the families.

However large the family, the rule up to now has been one room per family, with the regulatory number of three beds. Husbands were not allowed in after nine o'clock and had to find alternative sleeping accommodation. Cooking and washing facilities were provided, but only at the rate of two cookers and one bath to six families. The reason for this primitive type of accommodation was because it was felt that it would act as an incentive to the families to find their own homes more quickly. To house them too comfortably in the Unit might discourage them from leaving and might also appear to condone the actions of those families evicted for some offence.

It has now been recognised that many of the families who find themselves in the Unit, are there through no fault of their own. To find such minimal accommodation for these families is to add to the suffering which many of the families already have. Also, for the children of the families, such overcrowding and the separation from their fathers, can only cause harm.

From now onwards, a general social worker is to be appointed to deal with the homeless families and with the potentially homeless (i.e. those in rent arrears or in matrimonial difficulties). It is hoped that by tackling problems which cause homelessness early, the break-up of families may be avoided. The Homeless Unit itself is to be rearranged, so that each family will be virtually independent and fathers will be allowed to live with their

families. This will remove the feeling that it is a fair punishment to a family to split them up, just when they are in greatest trouble.

Quite soon, the old Sunnyside Mansions, previously independent flats, will be ready for use to house families with deep emotional, personality or family problems. There will be a Warden in charge and families which previously would have been left to battle with problems that were insoluble, will be helped to work their way through these problems and begin a new life. The Homeless Unit in Slade Park has been through very bad times. On October 17<sup>th</sup> last year, there were 13 mothers and 44 children there. It is to be hoped that the plans for the future will do much to compensate for the misery and unhappiness that has been lived out in the midst of us.

#### EDITOR'S NOTE:

Whilst computerising the baptism register for St Francis' Church, it was noticed that a number of baptisms were for patients at the Isolation Hospital and Slade Hospital. The area then became Slade Camp, a development for homeless people which, eventually, was succeeded by the housing development currently occupying the site.

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# Plant Sale Mania

The date of Saturday 18<sup>th</sup> May 2019 had been at the front of my mind for a long time. It was the day of this year's Plant Sale. It started last September when my seed order was dispatched, followed by my orders of small plug plants in January. Since the autumn I had been finding plants in the garden that could be split and potted up for the sale.

February saw me sowing my first seeds, chillies, in the small electric propagator. They germinate and grow very slowly. Then as they were moved on, other seeds were sown. March and April saw me pricking out and potting on. 280 plug plants arrived and I had to find pots, compost and frost free space for them all. My request for small pots produced enough and more and, often, just in time of my running out, which was great.

My greenhouse became full and some plants were put in the shed which gets lots of light from windows on three sides. More trays were placed on top of the washing machine, dryer and cupboard in our lean-to. About a week to go, I was able to cross fingers about night frosts and put the hardiest plants outside.

We had a power cut on the Sunday before the Sale and the fault was found in cabling under the pavement right outside our gate. The Tuesday found SSE digging a big hole in which the cabling was fixed but they didn't come back to fill it!

Luckily, the workmen had suggested we move the car out but we then had the pantomime of finding a parking space in the road for the next few days. On Friday morning I was working hard to make sure that every plant was labelled and priced. Every time we had visited the supermarket in the last few weeks, I had been collecting lots of the cardboard boxes that fruit come in. All were used to box up the plants and, together with other containers, we ended up with 44!

It was a bit of a bind to fill up the car with boxes outside in the road each time but we managed to get everything to the Church Centre in fewer trips than we thought we would need.

As it was, it was a hectic, tiring and enjoyable day. Apparently, we had a long queue before the 10am door opening! Lots of people gave their time to help and I do wish to thank you all for the support. We raised £1,270 towards the "Flush" Fund to get an accessible toilet in St James' Church and its consequent drainage pipework

Are we going to do it all again next year? Of course! Put Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> May 2020 in your diaries!

By the way, we eventually had the hole filled in a few days later!

# Christian Values for Europe

Will we be in? Will we be out? When? How? On what terms? I have no idea what is going to happen next with regards to Brexit but I am certain of one thing – unless something really amazing happens Britain will still be a European country next year and for many centuries to come. Tectonic plates shift and geologists tell us that Britain was once ‘stuck on to’ Greenland but that was many millennia ago. At least for my life-time I will be a European!

As a meeting of leaders of European Churches last month, held in Romania, the General Secretary, Fr. Heikki Huttunen, reminded delegates that despite all the challenges we face day by day we still live in the most privileged continent on earth. Our economy, our health care, our education, our freedoms, our security and much more all stand head and shoulders above those of other continents. We thank God for all we have but we also need to face our responsibilities as a privileged continent.



During that meeting on 9 May (Europe Day) the 114 member churches in 40 European countries agreed a set of seven priorities for ‘a Responsible Europe’ in the context of many global challenges. I thought it might be helpful if we, as a church in one of the more prosperous European cities, took note of just three of these. (Perhaps I will return to the other four next month.)

**Ecological and Economic Justice:** When I was at school we occasionally missed a day in the classroom to ‘bunk off’ and go to the fair or a sports match but today our young people have been regularly missing their classes because they are deeply concerned about the planet we are leaving them, choking on plastic, losing hundreds of species every month and with millions of people threatened by climate change. Europe has the economic strength, the research capacity and the resources to clean up our planet – but will we do it? Will we listen to the pleas of our children? Justice is a biblical principle and as European Christians we need to take justice seriously in economics and creation care.

**Popularism and Extremism:** The church leaders who met in Romania identify the cause of terrorism, extremism and populist politics as an underlying experience of ‘exclusion, deprivation and hopelessness’ both within Europe and outside. They suggest that terrorists will never be defeated by war or security measures but only by economic development, equal-

ity, inclusion and giving hope to ordinary people. Hope is a strong theme in the Bible. How can we as European Christians give hope to those who are hopeless?

Racism and Discrimination: There are no racisms in Britain today, certainly not in the churches. True? I'll let you answer that question for yourself. Discrimination happens in so many different ways in our world today but that must never be acceptable to European Christians. The Bible clearly shows us that every person, of whatever background, is a 'child of God' and all God's children are equal in His eyes – so why should we see them differently?

Whatever happens to Brexit and the EU, may each of us learn to be a responsible European Christian, aware of our privileges, and working for a more sustainable, more just, WORLD.
