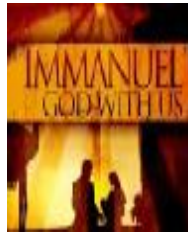

Yet they still seem to have a fascination for our festive card designers.

The star that they followed was almost certainly a comet, whereas the stars of the angels revealed to the shepherds were much smaller and less bright as the NT Greek reveals.

As a result of their meeting with Herod the Holy family were forced to become refugees, and Joseph did a fine job of guiding his wife and child to the safety of Egypt in haste.

We often forget this when telling the Christian story.

EXTRACTS FROM THE COWLEY NEIGHBOURHOOD NEWSLETTER, THAMES VALLEY POLICE

The Neighbourhood Officers are: Andy Hellas; Gareth Morley; Chrisy Jupp; Anna Houlston; Jan Billingham; Katie Martin; James Gordon

There is also a new PCSO, Emma Kidd, who says: *"I have been with the Cowley Neighbourhood team since October and so far have enjoyed getting to know my new role as a PCSO, meeting a great team and getting to know the area. My previous work has been supporting vulnerable children and families and working alongside social care to keep them out of the care system. My new team have been great and have made me feel at home very quickly, thank you very much everyone for all your support. I look forward to getting to know you and the job a lot better soon."*

The report contains the following:

Priorities

We have had some problems identified to us by the community which we are working to try and resolve. These are:

1. Drug use in Florence Park toilets

We have been told of some Class A drugs use in the toilets at Florence Park. We are currently working to identify and prosecute those responsible.

2. Robberies at Templars Square

We are aware people have been victim to Robbery in and around Templars Square Shopping Centre. We are working with the Shopping Centre to identify and prosecute those responsible.

3. Shoplifting at Christmas

There is traditionally a rise in shoplifting at Christmas. We will be putting on extra patrols at Templars Square Shopping Centre and Templars Retail Park around the weekends to disrupt this.

Police Events:

We have the following events planned:

10 December 2016: Winter Burglary Crime Prevention Event:

This is an event being held at Templars Shopping Centre where we will be highlighting the increased risks of burglary at this time of year

11 December 2016: Vehicle Crime Event:

This is an event being held at Templars Retail Park where we will be highlighting the dangers of leaving valuable property in your car

7 January 2017: Winter Burglary Crime Prevention Event:

This is an event being held at Templars Shopping Centre where we will be highlighting the increased risks of burglary at this time of year

4 February 2017: Bike Registration Event

We will be holding an event outside Halfords where we will be registering bikes onto the national database immobilise.com

Multi-agency Warrant

On 16 November 2016 the Cowley Neighbourhood Team working together with colleagues from Oxford City Council, Immigration, and the Department of Works and Pensions executed a warrant at an address on Glanville Road in Oxford. This was in relation to the use of fraudulent documents to obtain a National Insurance number and driving licence. Enquiries are ongoing.

Child Car Safety Event

On 15 November 2016 the Cowley Neighbourhood Team together with colleagues from Roads Policing took part in an operation to deal with the problem of parents not using a child seat for their children whilst driving. Despite being pre-warned about the legislation on the day of the event seven parents were issued warnings or tickets for the lack of seat belts and/or child seats.

Crime Prevention

Thames Valley Police is today (21/11) launching a week long campaign giving advice to help people be [#SafeAtHome](#).

Following on from the broadcast earlier this year of the ground-breaking documentary on domestic abuse Behind Closed Doors, which followed TVP's work with victims of domestic abuse over a year, the issue remains a top priority for the Force.

The [#SafeAtHome](#) campaign flags the help there is for victims, their families and friends and the action to take if you believe someone you know is a victim of domestic abuse (DA).

Details are also given of Arrests, Charges, Cautions, etc. In the last 30 days 42 people have been arrested in the Neighbourhood for various offences.

Christmas lunch and much more for £23

“Do you think you could help us buy Christmas lunch and a new set of clothes for each of the evangelists and pastors that work with us, about 50 of them”, wrote a colleague in Odisha, India, recently. “Many of these church leaders in the rural area cannot afford new clothes and without some help they will not be able to celebrate Christmas with a little meat” explained Pranab. I did some rapid calculations in my head ... meals for about 300 people, guessing each pastor would have a family of six, and 50 sets of new clothes. My mental arithmetic was closing in on the £10,000 mark when I continued to read on to where he said, “£23 for each pastor”. That must be for the meal I thought and read on to find out how much the tailoring was going to cost. Then I realised that that was it. Christmas lunch for six and a new set of clothes for the pastor, all in, at £23. Then I began to worry about the cost of my Christmas!

Pranab leads a small mission agency in Odisha which is one of the areas of India where Christians come under a lot of pressure. Just a few years ago several churches were burnt and pastors were beaten and even killed. People are poor and life is hard in the villages but, with support from people like Pranab, the local people are determined to go on following in the ways of Jesus. Pranab’s mission is called New Life for India and they joined the Faith2Share network that I serve a few years ago. Over those years

Pranab has become a trusted and valued friend who is never phased by life’s many challenges – always a smile on his broad face.

So what did we do? The only thing we could do, we stepped out in faith and sent Pranab US\$1,000 so that he could get those Christmas meals and the clothes bought before Christmas Day. As you do your own Christmas shopping if you want to add £23 for a church leader in India, so he and his family can celebrate the birth of Jesus and look a little smarter next year, you can easily do this on the Faith2Share website at www.faith2share.net/donate or you can slip me an envelope in church. I know I am going to enjoy my Christmas lunch just a little better if I know some families in India are also eating chicken rather than just rice.

Next to the huts, where the big house was built, was the Victorian vicarage with its extensive garden.

On a fine day each February, after lunch Miss Bullock would gather her little ones together to walk them through the vicarage garden to see the carpet of snowdrops there. They would walk on through the small gate which opened into the churchyard where there were more and more snowdrops. It was, then, back to the classroom where the children were taught this little poem:

“Where are the snowdrops?” said the sun
“Dead” said the frost, “Buried and lost, ev’ry one”.
“A foolish answer”, said the sun, “they did not die,
Asleep they lie, ev’ry one.
And I will wake them, I the sun,
Into the light all clad in white, ev’ry one”.

And, of course that it just what had happened.



Now it is our turn to see those lovely snowdrops, “all clad in white” in our beautiful ancient churchyard. DOORSTEPS CONFERENCE

Saturday 5 November, held at the CMS offices, Cowley

Report by Lesley Williams

Doorsteps is a local network of church ministers, children's and youth workers and charity leaders from across the county, coordinated through the international charity Viva, based in Marston Street, just off the Cowley Road, which is committed to "inspiring lasting change in children's lives through the power of collective action because we have a vision to see children safe, well and fulfilling their God-given potential".

The belief behind the establishment of the network is that "When you inspire a church to reach out to the children on its doorstep, you can call on a body of people with a mandate to love, pray, give and serve sacrificially".

As well as Viva, planning partners for this conference were: Balsam Family Project (Didcot), the Diocese of Oxford (who also helped to fund the event), the Cutteslowe family project (through St Andrew's, Summertown), Cowley Church Community and the charity Home for Good.

The focus was the major cuts faced by county council-run children's and families services in Oxfordshire, with the closure of many open access Children's Centres, including Florence Park and the Slade & Headington Centres in our Parish. More than 100 people attended the conference to explore how to work together more effectively to meet the needs of vulnerable people in their communities.

Through keynote talks, workshops, testimonies and small group discussions, the aim of the day was to inspire people with fresh ideas and encourage greater collaboration.

Supt Joe Kidman, Police Commander for Oxford, an active Christian with an Oxford theology degree, opened the conference by highlighting how churches can impact the whole community and work alongside authorities. He reminded us: *"The police and the Church have common ground in keeping young people safe and helping them thrive"* and challenged us with the question: *"What can we as churches plant to affect generations to come?"*

Maria Godfrey, Early Intervention Service Manager for Oxfordshire County Council explained that they need to make £6 million of savings by 2018, whilst at the same time seeing 3,000 children in the county requiring statutory social care, a number which is rising. Whilst the Council are required to meet these children's needs, other areas of work are seeing cutbacks, including children's centres, and its solution is to find a new way of delivering these local services by working more closely with community groups. Maria said, *"We have listened to people and know that social isolation and cohesion are real concerns with cuts coming in. We recognise that we can address some issues but not all of them, and that's where we feel the Church can help. We know that faith groups already*

take a leadership role in local communities. We encourage you to build on this."

Delegates at the conference had the opportunity to attend three out of nine workshops on a variety of related themes, hosted by different charities and churches. I went to those presented by (1) Fusion Y&C UK on using research to strengthen our local mission; (2) the Cutteslowe & Balsam family projects on building purposeful relationships in our communities and (3) Thrive, on their youth mentoring work in Barton and Blackbird Leys.

We then met with our own locality based church representatives (Cowley & East Oxford) and, following the conference, Doorsteps is facilitating a gathering of these churches to progress the agenda. Those attending included Cowley Church Community, Word Fountain - Hollow

Way, St Aldate's, St Clement's, Emmanuel and Greyfriars churches.

We will meet on Tuesday 17 January at 7:30 pm, venue to be decided. *If anyone is interested in joining the conversation, please let me know.*

Katy Thompson, the Doorsteps coordinator, says: *"I really hope we will see the fruit of this day in the months to come as groups work together in their local community to turn these ideas into practical action, such as family befriending or child mentoring or working with, for example, health visitors in church settings. The possibilities are endless."*

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CHURCHES WITHIN OUR DEANERY

ST NICHOLAS, OLD MARSTON



In the year 1122 the Chapel of Marston was granted to St Frideswide's Priory by King Henry I. By the late 12th century the central part of the church was built, together with the Chancel.

During the 15th century the tower was added and the roof raised, then in 1883 the Gallery was removed from the west end when major refurbishment took place.

In the Porch there can be seen a plaque to the memory of Howard Florey, the scientist who helped bring the wonder drug of the 20th century, 'Penicillin,' to the fore.

Beyond the Memorial Garden, a new 'Garden of Remembrance' has been created, and this was opened in June 2016.
