CHILDREN'S CORNER

Hello' everyone. Back to school and all that hard work after the holidays but lots of opportunities to be YOU.

The message last month would have read 'keep your eyes open and watch where you walk on the stairs before you go to have a rest, and wipe your shoes first.' And TTFN is short for Ta Ta for now!

This month I thought we would talk a little about ourselves. YOU. Everyone is unique which means that no one is the same as you. That doesn't mean there is anything wrong with you because you are different in looks or shorter/taller than anyone else in your family. Perhaps that's a good thing you may say, and sometimes it is, but when you think about it many people are similar but have their own special thoughts and ways of doing the things. You can be recognised by your looks, your speech, and even how you write your name or a letter. Some employers even ask for applications for jobs 'in writing' and not by printed typed or computer because you really can tell a lot from the handwriting of someone.

When I was in an office I dealt with correspondence from people who owned motor cars. We could receive a letter from the same person after they next purchased another car. If it was a complaint, we often recognised them by the way that they wrote the letter, because of the words used, where they came from and even in their hand writing. I remembered one owner although he had only written one letter before, and that was two years previously. There are specialist people who say that they can tell your character from your hand writing.

This surprised me until someone examined my writing and told me some very home truths. And they were correct. It's all to do with the way you cross the letter 't', write numbers, and even whether you are sloping to the left or right. There are so many ways that you are different to anyone else.

You can also be recognised by strangers who may not meet you very often but recognise you when they see you again in a different location. This is because you are special and unique. There is nothing wrong with a local accent in your speech but you will be surprised when people recognise even the way that you walk or engage in conversation. Or it might be the way you are dressed. This is your character. Be proud of it because this is also your signature. If you want to have a bit of fun one day ask for some help from a friend and dress their way when you return home especially if your hair is a similar colour. You may not be recognised at first, but I am sure that as soon as you speak, you will be found out.

And of course there is one special item that only you have. That is your thumb print. If you make a thumb print, preferably on a waste piece of paper, no-one else has the same one as you. It may look the same but when you look carefully, it will be different. Don't try it too often, otherwise you may put your thumb print in the wrong place, but it does show that you are the only one like you. Isn't that amazing! Millions of people in the world and only one person like you.

That means you are special, not only to Mum and Dad and brothers and sisters, and friends, but also to those who you meet at school, church or Sunday school. Because there is only one of you. Look after yourself and thank God for the opportunity to be just YOU.

Some people say that you should strive to be perfect, but have you thought what this would mean? Everyone would look and speak in the same way, and there would be no need to try to do better or improve the job done. Sometimes if you see a lot of 'perfect' items at the same time they may look good as though they came from a machine, but without character. That is proba-

bly why I like real wooden floors or hand-made furniture. Not everything is perfect.

I once saw a demonstration of how a piece of music that sounded OK to me could be 'improved' with a computer 'correcting' the slight variation of the notes as played by different instruments. The result was a very precise piece of music, exactly as printed on the score. But it had no character and sounded *too* perfect. While we should always try to do our best, the slight differences may show our special way of doing things. That doesn't mean that you can always please yourself what and how and when you do it though!

RIDE AND STRIDE 2019 St James Rider Lesley Williams writes:

As I generally only cycle around Cowley and into Oxford, I always look forward to this day of riding further afield, alternating annually between countryside (*last year out to Chalgrove*) and city, when one can of course easily log far more churches.

The weather this year, on Saturday 14 September, was idyllic so I was happy to be out from 11.00 to 5.30, visiting 32 (*although some were not open so just received a fleeting prayer on my way past*) churches and chapels. My route was Cowley – Headington – New & Old Marston (*I met Skye just finishing her duty stint at St Nicholas*) – Summertown – Wolvercote – Wytham – Botley – North, South and New Hinksey – Iffley.

It was good to pray in churches which I hadn't previously visited and chat to the welcomers, and politely decline many drinks and biscuits. Special was Marston United Reformed Church; having grown up as a Congregationalist (*which became URC*), I still like to know how those particular congregations serve their communities. Tucked into that small building on the Marston Road is a very clever flexible space.

But the best part of the day was at All Saints, Wytham; it is tucked away at the end of a lane so I was aided by the 'D & M wedding this way' sign by the White Hart. I spent a few minutes reading the interesting history of the church board just before the stone archway into the churchyard. As I then stood in the archway, the wedding party issued out of the church doorway. The priest looks remarkably like John Tomlinson, I thought; and then that lady in a hat, she could be Clare? I dared to get closer and, still clad in cycle helmet and high viz jacket, infiltrated the crowd. And of course it *was* John and Clare and the marriage was of David and Milly, who live in Eynsham! There was much hugging and laughter with the Tomlinsons – and then with Lyn and David Lord! It was such a wonderfully timed, happy coincidence. I also know the All Saint's Church Warden – another former headteacher – so we had a useful catch up too, actually about Hazel ffennell and the Hill End Centre, but that's another story.

I was delighted that I didn't ache at all the next day....and sponsorship is still coming in. John Booty, Jane Coutanche and I have paper sponsorship forms and I also have an on line page: <http://uk.virginmoneygiving.com/>

The money raised is divided equally between the Parish and the Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust, from which we hope to get a grant for the flush fund, so giving is a win-win.

RECIPES

This recipe is from World Cancer Research Fund

Haddock and Bean Chowder (Serves 2)

Ingredients:

- 1 teaspoon olive oil
- 1 small leek, thinly sliced
- 1 clove garlic, finely diced
- 1 small courgette, sliced
- 6 medium sized new potatoes, quartered
- 1 x 198g can salt-free sweetcorn, drained
- 500ml skimmed milk
- One-quarter teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1 bay leaf
- One-quarter teaspoon cayenne pepper (optional)
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 200g haddock (or other white fish), skinless, cut into bite-size pieces
- 400g beans, such as haricot, flageolet, cannellini, or butterbeans, drained and rinsed
- Small handful parsley, chopped
- ½ lemon, cut into wedges

Method:

- ∅ Preheat the oven to 180°C/Fan 160°C.
- ∅ Warm the oil in a non-stick pan and gently fry the leek and garlic for 2 minutes. Add the courgette and fry for a further 2 minutes.
- ∅ Add the potatoes, sweetcorn, milk, salt, bay leaf, cayenne pepper and black pepper; and bring to the boil. Carefully pour into an ovenproof dish, cover and place in the oven for 15 minutes.
- ∅ Remove from the oven. Gently stir in the fish and beans; cover and return to the oven for a further 15 minutes or until the fish is cooked and the vegetables are tender.
- ∅ Gently stir in the parsley. Transfer to a serving dish and garnish with a lemon wedge.



The following recipe is from Cakes, Bakes, Puddings and Prayers by Susan Over:

Crafty Mandarin Pudding (Serves 3-4)

Ingredients:

- 50g (2oz) butter or margarine
- 2 Eggs
- 159 ml (quarter pint) milk
- 1 teaspoon vanilla essence
- 225g (8oz) tin mandarin segments
- 4 slices 'day old' thick granary bread or use white bread if you prefer
- 4-6 squares of plain chocolate for decoration

Method:

1. Melt butter or margarine in a medium-sized casserole dish in the microwave for about 3-40 seconds.
2. Add eggs and beat well.
3. Stir in the milk, sugar, vanilla essence and drained mandarins. Mix well.
4. Remove the crusts from the bread, cut into cubes and stir into the mixture. Leave to stand for about 5 minutes.
5. Microwave on FULL power for 5-6 minutes or until set.
6. Melt the chocolate in the microwave on LOW power for 1 minute, then drizzle or zig-zag it over the top.
7. Allow to cool for a couple of minutes before serving with vanilla ice-cream or single cream.

From the Archives

ST LUKE'S HOUSE

JUNE 1958

VALUABLE LAND

It is a tremendous advantage for the family life of a parish if all its buildings are close together. It is then easier for everyone to have a real sense of belonging, not just to a building but to the family of Christ.

Two and a half years ago the management committee started to try and purchase a piece of land adjoining the church with a view to building a priest's house, and if possible, some rooms adjoining the church for general parish purposes. Now at last it seems that the parish will be allowed to buy from the City a strip of land with a 40ft. frontage onto Temple Road facing the Library, and flanking the exit from Morris Motors transport. At the back end, the land adjoins the existing church property. During the past three years St. Luke's have managed to gather a reserve of £800, which should be sufficient for the purchase of the land.

DESIRABLE RESIDENCE

A plan for St. Luke's House has been produced by Messrs. Beecher and Stamford, Architects, and it is hoped that building will start within a few months. It is possible to see how much of the cost of the house will be met, but there is still a sizeable gap to be covered. Somehow a lot of extra money must be raised. It is proposed to have a special gift day on St. Luke's Day, October 18th, but not the sort of gift day which you only start thinking about when it comes, but one you save and prepare for. A model of the proposed house will be on view at the Fete and at other times. There will be a list of items needed in the house, for example:
